

SPRING FORMAL DRESS CODE for LADIES

Why does the Spring Formal have a dress code?

The Spring Formal Committee wants everyone attending to honor others by making modest choices regarding what you wear. The dress you choose needs to be one you love but also one that is modest and acceptable according to the guidelines we have agreed upon as a committee out of respect for all of those attending.

#1 - Dresses may not be cut below the bust line. The bust line continues around your side directly under the armpit. With your arms down by your side, if flesh touches flesh below the bust line, the dress is inappropriate. Please, no cleavage, plunging necklines or mesh in the bust of the dress. Strapless dresses are acceptable if they meet all of the guidelines. A simple test when picking out a dress would be to place your hand sideways where your neck meets your collar bone. If the dress is cut below your hand, the bust line is too low.

These dresses meet the dress code:



#2 – Dresses may be open in the back, however, they may not be cut below the natural waistline (in line with the bellybutton).

#3 – The length of the dress and slits must be no shorter than just above the knee. Dresses must be able to remain no shorter than just above the knee while walking and dancing in the dress.
